THE 2023 LEIPZIG BACHFEST AT A GLANCE

With its programme entitled »BACH for Future«, the 2023 Leipzig Bachfest is commemorating an important anniversary: on the 1st Sunday after Trinity 1723, Bach took up his post as Thomaskantor in Leipzig. The first Sunday of the 2023 Bachfest will mark the tricentenary of this momentous occasion.

During his first year in office, Johann Sebastian Bach presented his audience with an incredibly rich and complex musical cosmos that radiated far into the future and which, at the 2023 Leipzig Bachfest, will be revealed in all its numerous facets, in the original venues, and interpreted by renowned artists. Numerous concerts will feature works that Bach put to paper during his first year of service.

One focus will be on Bach's first Leipzig annual cycle of cantatas. From the 1st Sunday after Trinity 1723 to the Feast of the Trinity 1724, the newly appointed Thomaskantor performed nothing but his own works in the church services at St. Thomas' and St. Nicholas': 63 cantatas in all, 38 of which were new compositions. In the »Best of Annual Cycle 1« series, four top experts on Bach's cantatas – Philippe Herreweghe, Ton Koopman, Hans-Christoph Rademann und Rudolf Lutz – will not only perform their favourite pieces from Bach's first Leipzig annual cycle of cantatas with their own ensembles; they will also explain what they find so fascinating about these pieces and what ostensible or hidden messages they discover in Bach's music.

»BACH for Future« also presents Bach's music in new contexts, with fresh new formats and many surprising adaptations and reinterpretations of well-known works. More than 160 events are scheduled for this festival season in more than 30 venues in and around Leipzig.

The Leipzig Bachfest is funded by the City of Leipzig and the Ministry of Science, Culture and Tourism of the Free State of Saxony. The main sponsor of the Leipzig Bachfest is Sparkasse Leipzig.

Ensembles and conductors

Many of the best-known Bach interpreters will be performing at the Leipzig Bachfest, including the Amsterdam Baroque Orchestra & Choir led by Ton Koopman, the Bach Collegium Japan led by Masaaki Suzuki, Camerata Köln, Capricornus Consort Basel led by Péter Barczi (violin), the choir and orchestra of the J. S. Bach Foundation in St. Gallen led by Rudolf Lutz, Collegium Vocale Gent led by Philippe Herreweghe, Europa Galante led Fabio Biondi (violin), Gaechinger Cantorey led by Hans-Christoph Rademann, Les Passions de l'Âme led by Meret Lüthi (violin), Musica Fiata and La Capella Ducale led by Roland Wilson, Neues Bachisches Collegium Musicum led by Reinhard Goebel, Solomon's Knot, and Vox Luminis led by Lionel Meunier. Also, besides THOMANERCHOR Leipzig, a "Boys' Choir Summit" will feature the Dresdner Kreuzchor, Knabenchor Hannover and Windsbacher Knabenchor.

Soloists

Performing with the 2023 Leipzig Bachfest ensembles are soloists such as Amarcordplus, Elvira Bill (alto), Hana Blažíková (soprano), Maarten Engeltjes (countertenor), David Erler (countertenor in the alto vocal range), Miriam Feuersinger (soprano), Bach Prize winner Patrick Grahl (tenor), Roberta Invernizzi (soprano), Bach Prize winner Daniel Johannsen (tenor), Benedikt Kristjánsson (tenor), Philipp Lamprecht (percussion), Tilman Lichdi (tenor), Bach Medal laureate Klaus Mertens (bass), Alex Potter (countertenor in the alto vocal range), Bach Prize winner Benno Schachtner (countertenor in the alto vocal range), Stefan Temmingh (recorder), Bach Prize winner Geneviève Tschumi (alto) and Hanna Zumsande (soprano).

Among the performers of **recitals and chamber and organ concerts** you will have a chance to hear pianists Sergei Babayan, Bach Medal laureate Angela Hewitt, Alexander Paley and Bach Prize winner Ragna Schirmer, harpsichordist Pieter Dirksen, lutenist Edin Karamazov, organist Olivier Latry and recorder player Dorothee Oberlinger as well as violinist Leila Schayegh, who will perform together with harpsichordist Andreas Bötticher. Johannes Pramsohler (violin) und Philippe Grisvard (harpsichord) will together perform two concerts of Bach's sonatas for violin and obbligato harpsichord.

THOMANERCHOR and Gewandhaus Orchestra

As is the tradition, Leipzig's own Thomanerchor and Gewandhaus Orchestra will perform the festival's opening concert. Besides works by Bach, they will perform a **commissioned composition by Jörg Widmann** as a pendant to Bach's own inaugural work of 1723. This famous boys' choir will also be singing a programme of motets in St. Thomas' Church on 15 June, can be heard at the »Tribute to Bach« concert on Leipzig's Marktplatz and will provide the musical accompaniment at the church service, based on the liturgy of Bach's time, in St. Thomas' Church on 18 June.

Partnership projects and third-party events

The open-air anniversary gala concert, **Tribute to Bach**, on 9 June will bring leading musicians – including **Lang Lang** and **Daniel Hope** – together on Leipzig's Marktplatz to pay a musical homage to Bach. This open-air Bach event of the year is organised in partnership with Deutsche Grammophon. The concert, produced by Heliodor, will be recorded by Armida Film and broadcast live: by ARTE Concert in German and French-speaking European countries and worldwide for STAGE+ subscribers, the new streaming service of Deutsche Grammophon (stage.plus/Bach300). An edited version of the concert will be broadcast on ARTE on 3 September.

Leipzig's two composer houses, Mendelssohn House and Schumann House, as well as the Leipzig Gewandhaus Orchestra, the MDR Symphony Orchestra and Leipzig Opera will again be playing a large role in the festival programme with productions of their own.

Bach research and panel discussions at the Bachfest

Leipzig Bach researchers present a wide-ranging academic programme at the Bachfest, with free lectures, pre-concert talks and panel discussions. The central event here is a **Musicology Conference** (15-17 June) on the appointment of the new Thomaskantor in 1723 and the history of the Protestant church cantata around 1720, organised jointly by the Leipzig Bach Archive, Martin Luther University Halle-Wittenberg and Johannes Gutenberg University, Mainz. You can enjoy another **Critics' Quartet** at this year's festival, this time with a discussion of recordings of J. S. Bach's *Magnificat*, BWV 243.

BachStage 2023

BachStage will kick off on Marktplatz at 6pm on 10 June with the programme all about the **1723 competition for the cantorate of St. Thomas'**: Miriam Feuersinger, one of the leading Bach sopranos of our time, and another award-winning musician, recorder player Stefan Temmingh, will be accompanied by Capricornus Consort Basel. The works will be presented by Bachfest's artistic director, Michael Maul. Later in the evening, in **Bach meets Heavy Metal** (10 June, 7:30pm), the stage will rock to the sound of heavy metal band Son of a Bach performing classics such as Bach's famous *Air on a G String* as you've never heard them before. Another highlight on 10 June is the WDR Big Band conducted by Jörg Achim Keller. With their programme, **Goldberg with Big Band**, the ensemble will be building bridges between the Baroque art of variation and modern orchestral jazz (9:15pm).

The second day of BachStage starts with an **open-air church service** featuring the brass ensemble of St. Thomas' Church, Leipzig University Choir and Pauliner Barockensemble conducted by the University music director David Timm (11 June, 10am). **Onde bachiane – Bach waves** is an attempt to investigate the rhythmic elements in Bach's music and amplify its harmonic depths using live electronic media and various percussion instruments. The performers are percussionist Philipp Lamprecht and sound designer Matthias Leboucher (11 June, 7:30pm). The BachStage finale features instrumental classics by Bach to which singer **Noa** – vocally somewhere between theatre, scat and rap – has written texts in English and Hebrew (11 June, 9:15pm).

Jörg Widmann, composer:

Presentation of Cantata for Soloists, Choir and Orchestra

(on the occasion of the $300^{\rm th}$ anniversary of the beginning of Johann Sebastian Bach's incumbency as Thomaskantor)

How, after a meditation for bells and bass clarinet, could a cantata in the year 2023 in tempore belli - begin in any other way than with Matthias Claudius' >Tis war! 'Tis war! - bloody, pale and wan. O God's angel, oppose it and have your say in it! Profound doubts as to the existence of God are also formulated in movement 3: >Is there no God?, based on the nightmare from Jean Paul's Speech of the dead Christ from the edifice of the world that there is no God. A possibly deceptive intermediary conclusion (>... And that's the end of that!<) is provided by the setting of the 1920s Brecht poem Lasst Euch nicht verführen! (Do not be led astray) as a four-part chorale. This complacent exhortation to enjoy life to the full is interrupted by an angry Old Testament God sternly asking people if that is the comfort on which they build. But in a section leading into a vocal quartet with texts from Timothy and Matthew and, lastly, the famous passage from the Corinthians, a gradually mellowed, New Testament God invokes the power of love. While all the powers of good aid and attend us, Dietrich Bonhoefer's haunting poem, written in great distress, rises up from the chorus, soloists, organ and orchestra, unfolds through all seven stanzas and finally leads into a celebration of peace (an old but ever-fresh text by Paul Gerhardt) and a Hallelujah. With all its doubts and contradictions. Paul Gerhardt's message is a universal truth: we are the ones who start and pursue war; not God.

V. Presentation of the 2023 Bach Medal to THOMANERCHOR Leipzig

At the opening of the 2023 Leipzig Bachfest on 8 June, the 2023 City of Leipzig Bach Medal will be awarded to THOMANERCHOR Leipzig. The Bach Medal is the highest distinction for music awarded by the City of Leipzig. The Thomanerchor has a history which goes back 800 years and from 1723 to 1750 was led by Johann Sebastian Bach. With regular performances of Bach's cantatas, Passions, oratorios and motets, the ensemble sets international standards. Admirers of the choir and its services to Bach's music have included Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy and Clara and Robert Schumann.

The distinction is awarded to all present and former choir members. The jury, consisting of the president of the Bach Archive, Ton Koopman, and its director, Professor Dr. h. c. Peter Wollny, Gewandhauskapellmeister Andris Nelsons and the rector of the Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy University of Music and Theatre in Leipzig, Prof. Gerald Fauth, gave the grounds for their decision: "No other ensemble has done so much over the past 300 years, and through the most diverse times, to uphold and disseminate Bach's church music as the Thomanerchor. In the tricentenary year of Bach's appointment as cantor, there could not be a more fitting laureate."

The Bach Medal of the City of Leipzig will be awarded by the mayor of Leipzig, Burkhard Jung, and the director of the Bach Archive, Prof. Dr. Dr. h. c. Peter Wollny. At 5pm that evening, the ensemble will perform cantatas by Johann Sebastian Bach and premiere a commissioned work for soloists, choir and orchestra by the composer Jörg Widmann, under the direction of the current Thomaskantor, Andreas Reize.

In recognition of their special services to the upholding of Bach's work, the City of Leipzig Bach Medal has previously been awarded to such figures as Sir András Schiff (2022), Prof. Dr. Hans-Joachim Schulze and Prof. Dr. Dr. h. c. mult. Christoph Wolff (2021), Angela Hewitt (2020), Prof. Dr. h. c. Robert Levin (2018), Masaaki Suzuki (2012), Herbert Blomstedt (2011), Philippe Herreweghe (2010), Nikolaus Harnoncourt † (2007), Prof. Dr. Ton Koopman (2006), Sir John Eliot Gardiner (2005), Helmuth Rilling (2004) and Gustav Leonhardt † (2003).

Current special exhibition:

»Clear the stage for Johann Sebastian Bach, Act 1: Church Music in Praise of God«

When Bach became Thomaskantor in Leipzig in 1723, a new chapter began in the history of music. He went on to shape Leipzig's musical life for 27 years, and it was from here that his works began their triumphal march around the world. But what exactly is the secret of Bach's music – and what makes it so innovative? On the occasion of the anniversary celebrating »Bach300 - 300 Years of Bach in Leipzig«, the Leipzig Bach Museum presents the tripartite special exhibition, »Clear the stage for Johann Sebastian Bach«. The first act began on 21 March – the 338th anniversary of Johann Sebastian Bach's birth – and will continue to shed light on Bach's »Church Music in Praise of God« until 9 July 2023.

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This special exhibition in the Leipzig Bach Museum invites visitors to explore Bach's musical cosmos. It deciphers complex compositions such as the *St. Matthew Passion* and the *Goldberg Variations* in an easy-to-understand way and encourages visitors to engage with Bach's music with a wealth of aural examples, hands-on activities, games and puzzles. Scenes from Bach's life are re-enacted in new 3D audio recordings. The exhibition shows how Bach has inspired composers from Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy and Gustav Mahler to the Beatles and Lady Gaga, as well as how his works are reflected in modernist visual arts.

The exhibition is a pendant to the Leipzig Museum of City History's new »Bach Parcours« (opened on 1 June 2023), which addresses Bach's achievements as seen through the eyes of his employers in Leipzig. Themed tours of both museums, concerts and workshops for youngsters round out the exhibitions.
